

Hosted by the IT Solutions Management for Human Services (ISM) Affinity Group, this year's conference will be held at the beautiful Spokane Convention Center, September 27-30, 2026, in Spokane, WA. Join the nation's brightest leaders, innovators, and changemakers as we come together to listen, learn, and inspire one another to build strategies for improving the lives of individuals, children, and families across the United States and beyond.

This year's theme, *Transforming Systems Through Technology & Innovation*, serves as our guide as we invite you to submit your session proposals. We will provide opportunities for human services leaders from states, counties, municipalities, tribes, and territories to connect with federal officials and leading firms in the technology and innovation sector; to learn best practices, policy insights, and technology innovations; and to develop their leadership skills.

We are seeking inspiring submissions that:

- **Highlight innovative policy, practice, and system approaches** to outcome measurement and impact evaluation; data analytics and interoperability; technology and service delivery; social impact, community engagement; emergency preparedness and crisis-response; funding and procurement strategies, and other pressing issue areas across the human services ecosystem.
- **Elevate the important work of the human services sector** in empowering and strengthening families and driving meaningful, sustainable change in our communities as demonstrated in research, program evaluations, project outcomes, success stories.
- **Showcasing leadership strategies** that foster a sense of resilience, workforce well-being, productive collaboration, and deep impact.

# CONTENT WILL BE ORGANIZED AROUND THE FOLLOWING AREAS:

- **Tech-Enabled Innovation – *Turning possibility into practice through technology***
  - Step into the future of human services and explore how technology is reshaping how agencies serve families and support the workforce. This focus area highlights emergent and disruptive technologies such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), Machine Learning (ML), automation, cloud platforms, cybersecurity, and digital infrastructure. Sessions will showcase practical implementations, modernization efforts, and lessons learned from deploying technology at scale, focusing on usability, sustainability, and readiness rather than hype alone.
- **People-Powered & Human-Centered Design – *Design with people, not for them***
  - Discover how human services systems are being transformed when communities, clients, and frontline staff are placed at the center of design. This focus area spotlights participatory frameworks, co-design practices, and human-centered design (HCD) approaches that strengthen service delivery and agency capacity. Sessions will feature community-led solutions, workforce-driven redesigns, and inclusive design practices that improve accessibility, trust, and real-world usability across programs and platforms.
- **Cross-Systems & Policy-Informed Alignment – *where policy, practice, and systems meet***
  - Learn how agencies are breaking down silos to deliver more coordinated, effective services across programs and partners. This focus area explores cross-system collaboration, interoperability, and operational change management that align policy, technology, and service delivery. Sessions will highlight how evidence-informed policy decisions and implementation data are used to guide system integration, navigate regulatory complexity, and support scalable, compliant, and person-centered solutions.

# CONTENT WILL BE ORGANIZED AROUND THE FOLLOWING AREAS:

- **Data-Driven & Evidence-Informed Program Delivery – *From insight to impact***
  - See how data and evidence are being translated into smarter decisions, stronger accountability, and better outcomes. This focus area focuses on the use of data sharing, analytics, performance management, and evaluation to inform program operations and continuous improvement. Sessions will highlight how agencies apply evidence-based and evidence-informed practices to measure impact, reduce disparities, protect privacy, and drive operational changes that improve accuracy and service effectiveness.
- **NEW: The Possibility Lab – *A space to imagine what could be***
  - Step into a space designed for imagination, exploration, and re-thinking what IT *could* become for IT in the human services sector.
  - The Possibility Lab is a forward-looking forum for state, county, and nonprofit leaders to challenge the status quo and explore emerging ideas, theories, and future-state concepts for human services IT. This focus area is intentionally open and exploratory, welcoming early-stage thinking, conceptual models, and “what if” scenarios that are not yet ready for implementation.
  - Sessions may take the form of e-poster presentations, short talks, or facilitated open discussions in an open-format setting. The emphasis is on public-sector–driven ideas that reimagine service delivery, systems, and experiences, creating space to think beyond current constraints, legacy systems, and existing approaches.

## **APHSA WELCOMES PROPOSALS AND PRESENTATIONS RELEVANT TO CURRENT TOPICS AND PRIORITIES ACROSS HUMAN SERVICES, WITH A PARTICULAR EMPHASIS ON THE FOLLOWING TOPICS:**

- Best practices and policy-enabled innovations across the wide spectrum of human services-related area: aging, adult services, child welfare, child care, child support, emergency preparedness, crisis response and resilience, early childhood, disability, housing, Medicaid, SNAP, TANF
- Human Services leadership development and agency workforce strategies for supporting recruitment and retention of staff, empowering a multigenerational workforce, promoting staff mental health and wellbeing, and building a culture of belonging.
- Collective action to advance belonging and outcomes in human services, such as by engaging people with lived experience in decision-making and implementing trauma-informed practices.
- Financing, procurement, and Advanced Planning Documents
- Topics related to Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA), Tribal Social Services, Tribal TANF and SNAP, and other related topics which are unique to tribal nations and territories.
- Community-engagement strategies and effective approaches for elevating the voices of people with lived experience (such as people with disabilities, people who have experienced or interacted with the child welfare system, and others who have received some type of human services.)
- Interoperability opportunities within and across systems and jurisdictions; data sharing, privacy and security lessons
- Data analytics and evaluation, dashboards, and performance objectives to promote continuous improvement and accountability
- Groundbreaking technology projects, including use of AI and machine learning, human-centered designs, with emphasis on concrete application for agencies in completing their work, engaging more effectively with customers in providing information and/or services
- Promising cross-sector partnerships focused on alignment in Medicaid, housing, public health, education
- New or ground-breaking research with implications for the human services sector

- Research, Evaluation, and Evidence in Action  
Built in partnership with the National Association for Welfare Research and Statistics (NAWRS), this track elevates the role of research, evaluation, and evidence in driving measurable change. We invite studies, evaluations, and success stories that strengthen families and communities, especially those that demonstrate how research translates into effective practice. Includes opportunities to be featured in the Research to Practice Showcase.

- System Innovation and Transformation  
This track explores cutting-edge strategies in data, technology, and policy that reimagine how systems operate, optimize performance, and deliver superior, lasting outcomes for all served. Share your innovations in interoperability, artificial intelligence, system redesign, or funding models that build long-term sustainability, resilience, and widespread impact. Submissions that elevate trauma-informed approaches and lived experience are especially encouraged.

- Workforce and Leadership Development  
This track focuses on strategies that strengthen workforce well-being, leadership capacity, and collaboration at every level. Share how your organization is supporting your workforce in adapting to I.R., building belonging, or redefining the culture of human services work. Ideal for leaders and innovators shaping the future of the human services sector.
